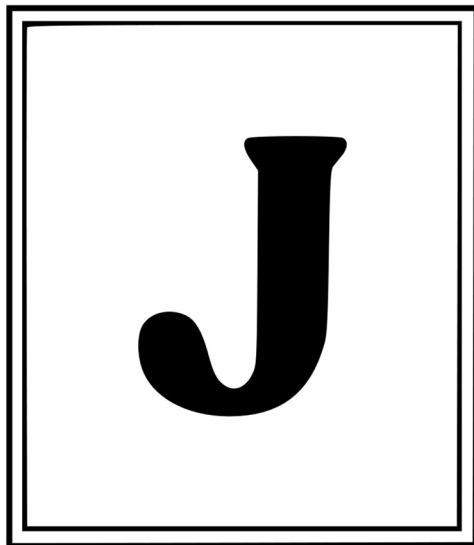




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GLOBALIZATION AND THE TRANSFORMATION OF CULTURAL AND LINGUISTIC IDENTITY IN THE TURKIC WORLD

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ANNOTATION:

This study examines the impact of globalization on cultural values and linguistic identity within Turkic societies by drawing on sociological and cultural theories, particularly the concept of “liquid modernity,” to explore the interaction between traditional Turkic values and emerging global cultural patterns, while also highlighting the role of digital technologies, education systems, and communication platforms in shaping contemporary cultural identities; the findings indicate that globalization does not eliminate traditional values but instead fosters a process of adaptation in which historical traditions coexist with modern global influences, although the growing dominance of global languages and digital communication systems creates significant challenges for preserving and developing Turkic languages and cultural heritage, thereby emphasizing the need to strengthen linguistic cooperation, develop digital resources, and promote cultural education for sustainable cultural continuity.

Introduction

Globalization has become one of the most powerful forces shaping cultural, social, and intellectual life in the twenty-first century. The expansion of digital technologies, global communication networks, and international academic exchange has significantly increased interaction between societies that were once separated by geographical distance and cultural boundaries. Within this global environment, the Turkic world represents a distinctive cultural and linguistic space formed by centuries of shared historical development, linguistic roots, and cultural traditions. Countries such as Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Turkey, Uzbekistan, and Turkmenistan maintain cultural ties that reflect common historical heritage while simultaneously participating in global modernization processes. As globalization intensifies, traditional cultural values increasingly interact with global cultural influences transmitted through media, education, and digital communication platforms. Scholars have described globalization as a process of “time–space compression,” in which distant societies become closely interconnected through technological development and international exchange⁴⁰. This interconnectedness creates new opportunities for cultural dialogue but also raises concerns regarding the preservation of national identity and traditional value systems. In the context of the Turkic world, globalization does not simply replace traditional cultural norms but initiates a complex process of transformation in which historical traditions are reinterpreted and adapted to contemporary social realities. As a result, understanding the interaction between globalization and cultural heritage

has become an important subject within modern Turkological research.

Main part

The transformation of cultural values within the Turkic world can be understood through broader sociological theories that explain the dynamics of modern societies. Zygmunt Bauman’s concept of “liquid modernity” suggests that contemporary social life is characterized by rapid change and flexible cultural structures that constantly evolve under the influence of technological and economic development⁴¹. In such conditions, cultural traditions are not static but continuously adapt to new social circumstances. For Turkic societies, which historically developed strong communal traditions emphasizing respect for elders, collective responsibility, and preservation of cultural heritage, globalization introduces new patterns of social interaction and cultural expression. Global media platforms, international travel, and digital communication expose individuals to diverse cultural ideas that influence lifestyle, consumption patterns, and social values. Younger generations in particular encounter global cultural narratives through social networks and digital entertainment, which contribute to the emergence of hybrid cultural identities combining traditional Turkic values with contemporary global perspectives. However, this transformation should not be interpreted as cultural decline. Instead, many societies demonstrate a capacity for cultural resilience in which traditional values are preserved while simultaneously adapting to modern social and technological developments⁴². Such cultural adaptation allows Turkic societies to maintain continuity with their historical heritage

Consequently, the development of technological resources for Turkic languages has become an important priority for scholars and policymakers. Initiatives such as digital language corpora, electronic dictionaries, machine translation systems, and artificial intelligence technologies can strengthen the digital presence of Turkic languages while supporting their use in education, research, and cultural communication. By integrating linguistic preservation with technological innovation, Turkic societies can ensure that their languages remain relevant in the global information environment.

Rather than viewing globalization solely as a threat to cultural traditions, it can be understood as a catalyst for cultural dialogue and intellectual collaboration. By integrating technological innovation with cultural preservation strategies, Turkic societies can strengthen their cultural resilience and ensure that their historical heritage remains meaningful for future generations. In this sense, globalization becomes not only a challenge but also a powerful opportunity for cultural renewal and cooperation within the Turkic world.
